ho is God? Who are you? Whom are we as a community of faith? These are the questions at the core of the Lutheran Reformation that we celebrate each year at the end of October.

A quick recap. In the early 1500s, Dr. Martin Luther began asking questions about life, faith and salvation that set off a firestorm in the Roman Catholic Church. Luther was especially upset about the sale of indulgences to guarantee people admittance to heaven. Luther taught that salvation and eternal life are not earned by good works but are the free gift of God's grace through faith in Jesus Christ. By breaking from the traditional teachings of his church, Luther became an outcast while also contributing to a religious and social movement that swept Europe. Many of his theological writings are deeply ingrained in those of us who embrace Lutheran Christianity over 500 years later. At the same time, Luther was not shy about teaching antisemitism. In many ways he was a prime example of humans existing simultaneously as saint and sinner.

### **Everyday Reformation**

Who is God? Who are you? Whom are we as a community of faith? As descendants of this activist movement, we are not only empowered to seek answers to these questions but driven to do so. Since we believe that God is constantly creating and recreating the universe, we have a reformation perspective on everything from church to politics to interactions with our friends and neighbors. Answering these questions is a community process so let's do it together. I'll start.

Who is God? God is the creator, savior and lover of everything and everyone. God is the listening ear, motivating force and peaceful presence I always sought but never knew I needed. God never gives up on us. God continues to pursue us until we allow ourselves to finally be embraced by heaven. God loves. Who is God to you?

Who am I? I am a child of God, adopted into God's family by the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. I am not, and will never be, alone. I am gifted and empowered to make the world a different place where love wins. I am in bondage to sin and cannot free myself. I am enmeshed in a culture that is both life-giving and life-denying and recognize my privilege on both sides of this human equation. Despite my failures, I am loved. Who are you?

Whom are we as a community of faith? We are God's hands, feet, voice, and heart in our little corner of the world. We are a collection of imperfect people who carry the perfect message for a broken and divided society. We should not be defined by economics or political parties or past prejudices but sometimes we are. We support each other, inspire each other, correct each other, and share our stories with each other. We are moldable and believe God is the one to fashion us into the community we dream of becoming. We are both powerful and dependent. We are loved. Whom are we as a community of faith?

While our annual Reformation celebration is a wonderful time to ask and answer these questions, we should not limit ourselves to once a year. These are everyday questions. Peace,

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### **Reformation Month** (October 25 to November 22)

Prince of Peace is expanding and enhancing our Reformation celebrations this year. Why? Because Reformation cannot be contained into one Sunday. Over the course of these five weeks, we will explore these themes:

- ▼ **October 25:** Who is God? What God has revealed about God.
- ▼ November 1: Who are you? What God has to say about our identity. (Also All Saints Sunday)
- ▼ November 8: Whom are we as a community of faith? Why God has called us together.
- ▼ November 15: Where do we go from here? Delivering peace in the midst of chaos. (Also Baptism Sunday)
- ▼ November 22: Reformation Power! We never stop learning to be like Jesus.



### Outdoor Worship Launches October 25 at 9:30 a.m.!

As part of our Reformation Month celebrations, we are moving worship outside to experience God with new joy and fresh perspective (and fresh air). We will also be continuing COVID-19 health and safety protocols with one huge exception: We will be singing praise to God together! Here are the details...

#### Location

The Preschool Courtyard (the center of our campus). Please enter from the south gate (adjacent to the south parking lot) or the main gate (just steps from the sanctuary). Handicap parking and access is available at the north gate (adjacent to the preschool office).

#### **Seating Arrangements**

So many options! Feel free to bring your own folding chairs or blankets to sit on the lawn. A limited number of chairs will be available for use on the concrete walkways (we will always find you a chair if you need one). For our senior saints and those with mobility issues, the deck area is reserved for you and your families.

#### **COVID-19 Protocols**

Masks are required. Physical distancing will be maintained in all seating areas. Families are encouraged to sit together in a "Lutheran Pod"! Please use hand sanitizer available at all entry points.

#### **Bulletins/Worship Programs**

Use your phone or tablet to scan the QRF code at one of the entry points (just like getting a menu in a restaurant) or download directly from the website. A limited number of "paper bulletins" will be available on Sunday morning.

#### Holy Communion and Offering

We will continue to use the self-contained communion kits which will be available at all entry points. Offering baskets will also be available at all entry points. #### Wellness Committee Understanding How Clinical Trials Work (Part one of a two-part series)

Recently there has been almost daily news coverage of the status of the various clinical trials of the hoped-for corona virus vaccines. As a result, many questions have been raised regarding clinical trials or studies. Since books have been written on clinical studies, the following is a brief overview.

There are different types of studies. One is an observational study in which there is no attempt to affect the outcome. Subjects are merely observed or certain outcomes are measured. Medical records research also does not attempt to affect the outcome. These studies review the medical records of large groups of people for long periods of time to learn how a disease progresses and which treatments work best. Clinical trials, which use human subjects, are essential to increasing medical knowledge and finding new and better ways to treat diseases or conditions. The results of a clinical trial make it possible to evaluate if the drug, vaccine or medical device which is the subject of the trial is safe and effective. Since 90 percent of drugs, etc. that reach the clinical-trial stage never receive FDA approval, without clinical trials many people would potentially be harmed and/or receive no benefit. Many years of research, frequently using animals, is usually conducted before clinical trials involving humans are begun.

There are three phases to a clinical trial. In Phase I, a small group of healthy people is given the vaccine being studied to determine its safety and potential side effects. If all goes well, the study advances to Phase II. In Phase II, the safety of the vaccine continues to be studied, but the effectiveness of the vaccine is the primary focus. Phase II trials usually involve 100 to 300 subjects and may last for several months to several years. Phase III trials, involving several hundred to several thousand participants, follow positive results from Phase II. One of the Phase III potential corona virus trials hopes to recruit 30,000 subjects in the United States and 10,000 in the United Kingdom. Another is recruiting 60,000 subjects across three

continents. The goal of the Phase III study is to learn more about the safety and effectiveness of the vaccine by studying different populations, different doses, and how the vaccine works in combination with other drugs and vaccines. Phase III studies usually last between one and five years. If the results are positive, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) will approve the vaccine.

After the vaccine receives FDA approval and is made available to the public, the safety and effectiveness continues to be monitored in large populations. Some side effects may not become apparent until the vaccine has been given to many people or for long periods of time. Those receiving the drug or vaccine will often be asked to report any adverse effects to the FDA. If, after approval, it is discovered that the drug or vaccine causes temporary health problems, poses a slight threat of serious injury, or could cause serious health problems or death, the drug or vaccine may be recalled and eventually withdrawn. A recall may occur as soon as a year after FDA approval, while other drugs may be available for 20 years or more before being recalled.

Clinical trials are conducted by various entities, including governmental agencies, universities, nonprofit organizations, and pharmaceutical, biotechnology and medical device companies. The FDA requires that certain clinical trials register with it and submit result information to the Clinicaltrials.gov data base to increase the sharing of information and to avoid unnecessary duplication. Clinical trials can be conducted in various locations, including medical centers, community hospitals, and doctors' offices. The research team will include a variety of health care professionals, including research scientists, doctors, nurses, social workers, and dieticians. All clinical trials involving human subjects must be approved by the Institutional Review Board (IRB) affiliated with the institution conducting the study before the trial can begin. IRB's are administrative bodies established to protect the rights and welfare of human research subjects. It has the authority to approve, disapprove, require modifications, and monitor the clinical trial. At least one member must not be a scientist or a member of an institution conducting the trial.
