Rolling Stones

April 2018

"They worried out loud to each other, 'Who will roll back the stone from the tomb for us?'" Mark 16:3

here is a classic story of a Sunday school teacher who staged an Easter pageant with her class. When it came time to assign parts, some children wanted to be soldiers, others the women at the tomb, still others the disciples. One little boy, however, insisted on playing the stone that was used to block the door of the tomb. No speaking part? "No," said the little boy, "I want to be the stone." The teacher asked why. "Because it will feel so good to let Jesus out of the tomb."

On the first Easter morning a group of women came to Jesus' tomb to finish getting his body ready for burial. What do you suppose those women were thinking about, talking about, as they made their way through the darkness that morning? The Gospel of Mark tells us the biggest thing that was on their minds—it was the stone that had been placed in front of the entrance to the tomb where Jesus' body had been placed.

And what about the stone? In front of the opening to the tomb was a groove in the ground; and in the groove ran a huge stone, circular like a cartwheel; and the stone had been wheeled into position to close the opening. It was far too heavy for the women to move. Plus, a seal was placed upon it so the Roman authorities would know if it had been tampered with.



Why was that stone there? The simple answer is that it was there to keep anyone from getting in or out. However, it also was meant to communicate something important. This stone said stop. This stone shouted that hope was lost. This stone whispered that death is final.

Until it was rolled away and discarded to the side of the tomb. In that moment, the message was forever changed. Our God rolls away stones. We all have them. Our stones are massive weights that we carry with us through life that prevent us from living joyfully.

Does your stone have a name? Maybe your stone is guilt. Perhaps something you have done or failed to do is haunting you. The first disciples must have felt it; they had let Jesus down horribly. Then Easter dawned and the stone was rolled away. Is your stone named guilt? Lord, roll

away that stone.

Maybe your stone is loneliness. You've lost a loved one or your children have gone away to college and live beyond the nest. A friend has walked out the door. You feel that you just don't fit in. Is your stone named loneliness? Lord, roll away that stone.

Maybe your stone is hopelessness. You look at your life and wonder how things will ever change. How will you pay all your bills? How will you get a good job? How will you deal with chronic pain? How will you ever please your parents? How will kids stop being killed by gun violence? Is your stone hopelessness? Lord, roll away that stone.

Your stone may have many names. The good news of Easter is that our God is a God of rolling stones. Some people call this irrational craziness. Some people call it a hoax. Some people call it a crutch for weak-minded people. I call it power, resurrection power. And once that kind of hope gets in your heart and mind, everything changes. We continue to follow a God who continues to roll stones away. I invite you to read that sentence again and smile as you ponder the implications.

Arcadia Cares: Food for Kidz



Fourth Annual Packathon Assembles 129,168 Meals

The Fourth Annual Arcadia Cares: Food for Kidz Packathon held on Saturday, March 24, 2018, was another amazing success. Hundreds of volunteers from age 3 on up participated from Prince of Peace Church and



Preschool, the Arcadia Camelback Mountain Neighborhood Association (ACMNA), Christ Lutheran School, Church of the Latter Day Saints, Veritas Preparatory Academy, Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, Brownies, Hopi Elementary School, Ingleside Middle School, Arcadia High School, and many others in the Arcadia neighborhood. Once the dust had settled, the final number of rice & bean meals packed was 129,168! This doubled the number of meals packed at the first packathon in 2015 (62,708). And the 2018 numbers improved upon the 2017 Packathon results by nearly 40,000 meals!



Food for Kidz, a non-profit organization based in Minnesota, provides staple ingredients, such as protein, rice, dehydrated vegetables, seasonings and vitamins, to make nutritious meals. The cost to purchase the necessary ingredients for packing one meal is 15 cents. Thank you to everyone who made donations to support the effort, including

sponsors Les Holland, our Church, Foundation & Preschool, Traaen & Associates, the Wooden family, Allen Quie, Jim Taylor, and numerous other generous individuals.

Approximately 75% of the meals packed this year will go to the Valley View Community Food Bank to remain here in the Phoenix area to serve needy families and individuals. Around 10,000 meals were delivered to the Navajo Nation Reservation in Northern Arizona and the remainder will be sent by Food for Kidz to overseas locations.

In 2015, there were 62,708 meals packed. In 2016, 73,296 meals were packed. Last year, there were 91,662 meals packed. With the 2018 numbers, the four-year total of meals packed is 356,834.

Dealing with Large & Unexpected Medical Costs

`Radio station NPR has begun a new monthly series called "Bill of the Month" as part of its Sunday weekend edition. The segment analyzes and explains real, unexpectedly large medical bills which have been submitted by listeners. The radio program may be new but the problem of surprise bills for health care is not.

Many if not most of those receiving the surprise bills have insurance, so why do the bills arrive? The most common reason is that the provider was out of the patient's insurance network. In non-emergencies, the best course of action is to inquire whether a provider is in your insurance plan's network. Because your physician is in-network doesn't mean that the lab she refers you to is also in network. In an emergency, verifying that a provider is in-network may not be possible. The hospital may be in-network but the anesthesiologist, radiologist, pathologist, or ER doctor may not be, unless he/she is an employee of the hospital. In these circumstances, it may not be possible to do anything until after the bill is received.

Additionally, insurance only covers care that is medically necessary and the insurance company determines what is medically necessary. When lab work, x-ray or other procedure is ordered, ask what it for. Unless the procedure must be done immediately, find out if it is considered to be medically necessary.

Most health plans are now paying for preventive care which includes services such as physicals, mammograms and colonoscopies. If services, even minor ones, are provided in addition to the one that specifically qualifies as preventive care, insurance doesn't pay. Every procedure is assigned a code and payment is based on that code. If the doctor's office doesn't use the specific code for what the insurer classifies as preventive, payment is denied. Before agreeing to any tests or procedures related to the approved preventive care, verify that any additional treatment is also considered preventive.

Large unexpected bills also arrive because physicians want to provide the patient with the best care and don't consider the price when prescribing a course of treatment. This is particularly true of drug prescriptions. Although doctors should talk to patients about the cost of treatment, patients need to take the initiative. Ask the cost of each new prescription. Since costs vary depending on coverage, it may also be necessary to contact the insurance carrier. If the price seems high, ask about the availability of a generic or over-thecounter version. Doctors may or may not react well to your concern. Also ask the pharmacist about less expensive alternatives when picking up the prescription.

If a large, unexpected bill appears in your mailbox, before paying it, contact the provider who sent the bill directly. Explain your surprise at receiving the bill and why you think it is unfair. Ask if the bill can be reduced to the amount that would be covered if the provider were in-network. The difference between the amount of the bill and what insurance pays is significant. Also call the insurer to verify that there is not a billing error, which is quite common. If there isn't an error and the insurance company won't negotiate, file an appeal asking that the out-of-network costs be paid. Instructions on how to appeal should be included with the bill. These procedures may take time because insurance companies, like the IRS and Social Security, almost always say "no" the first time.
