## Get Proximate

One of the most challenging speakers at this summer’s ELCA National Youth Gathering was Bryan Stevenson. Stevenson is the founder and executive director of the Equal Justice Initiative (EJI). Under Stevenson’s leadership, EJI has won legal challenges eliminating excessive and unfair sentencing, exonerating innocent death row prisoners, confronting abuse of the incarcerated and the mentally ill, and aiding children prosecuted as adults. EJI recently won a ruling in the U.S. Supreme Court holding that mandatory life-without-parole sentences for all children 17 or younger are unconstitutional. Stevenson described his calling to confront the legacy of injustice and inequality in America.

He said to be change agents, we need to “get proximate” — that is, get closer to the issues we are trying to address and the people we are trying to empower. Most of us are taught to stay away from such problems, Stevenson said, but “there is power in proximity.” Stevenson noted he would not have followed the career path he did if he had not taken a summer internship in law school that brought him face-to-face with death-row inmates. Stevenson believes that “if you are willing to get closer to people who are suffering, you will find the power to change the world.”

These words have been rolling around in my mind for the past few months. I believe that Prince of Peace has both a solemn responsibility and a

adjacent, touching, close to, beside, alongside of, within sniffing distance of



sacred opportunity to do all we can to make our world a different place. Certainly this entails high-level living: doing all we can to renounce discrimination, greed and hate in all their insidious forms. At the same time, we are propelled into everyday life with a simple mandate to love one another. How can we do this better? We can start by taking Bryan Stevenson’s advice and “getting proximate.” There are many ways to do this. Thankfully, I’ll only outline one.

For many years, Prince of Peace Preschool has been our most consistent touch point for the people in our community. We have children and parents on campus five days a week. Talk about proximate! Over the years we have made many attempts to build bridges with the preschool families in our care (usually from 1-4 years, depending on the family). Some have been successful. Others have not. I think the most important factor in our efforts is not fancy programs or glitzy advertising but getting proximate. If we want our community to know us, we need to

meet them, talk to them, work together and play together. In a wide variety of conversations and shared moments, we can discover the hopes and fears and joys and challenges of our community and act! Getting proximate is the key.

Come and set up a car at the POP Preschool Trunk or Treat event on October 26. Handing out candy to children is perhaps the easier way to meet members of our community. One key: the better you decorate, the more conversations you can have. And don’t forget to listen. Discovering the rhythms of our community can point the way to opportunities to do good.

I continue to be excited about Prince of Peace’s willingness to expand our preschool to welcome infants and toddlers and, of course, their parents. This will give us yet another opportunity to be proximate to new parents at exactly the time they are asking big questions about faith and hope and love. Our community is excited about the new infant and toddler care initiative. In fact, we are already getting calls multiple times per day. Amazing!

More strongly than ever, I believe we are planted on the corner of 56th and Indian School for reason. God continues to love the world through us. And we can do even more. So, let’s get proximate to find out what that “more” is.

# News from Arcadia Music Academy

We are excited to report how well Arcadia Music Academy is doing in 2018. We have grown from 61 students in April 2017 to 82 students in October 2017, and now 88 students in August 2018. Teachers keep telling us that they are at capacity and we have two new piano teachers who have expressed interest; however, we are currently in a holding pattern to see if we will have consistent space to use for additional teachers and lessons through the campus remodeling process. A few lessons have moved to the choir room and we are looking at possibly using other areas in the church if possible.

We had one teacher stop teaching at AMA due to the distance she had to commute and not enough time in her schedule to teach more than a few students one day a week.

We have seen an increase in income. This is a result of both the increase in students attending AMA and of the billing and auto-pay structure we put in place which allows us to easily collect on every lesson taken. For comparison purposes, these are the income figures for the month of August for the last four years:

## Preschool Expansion Initiative Update for October

As we move forward with a campus remodel in the coming months, it is critical to remember why we are doing this. Here's the big picture:

- Grow our successful preschool by adding new classrooms for infant and toddler care.
- Greater and earlier touchpoint to our community (families with small children).
- Phased strategy to build out new offices, backfill offices with new infant and toddler facilities while addressing deferred maintenance issues.
- Provide additional revenue stream for future ministry.
- Unintended opportunity for spring cleaning.

The project team has come together nicely.

- Prince of Peace Team. Scott and Nancy Stevens, Janet DeJonge, Steve Edgar, Pastor Rick and POP staff (as needed)
- Alliance Project Advisors. Providing pro bono project management services to manage overall project, consultants and vendors
- Reliance Build Inc. (RBI). Design build general contractor providing budgeting, scheduling and procurement services for the team
- Ramirez Architects. Parenting with RBI on the design. Art Ramirez is one of the longest-tenured and most recommended architects in Arizona.

In October, we hope to present preliminary architectural drawings and a construction budget to the church council for approval. Stay tuned.

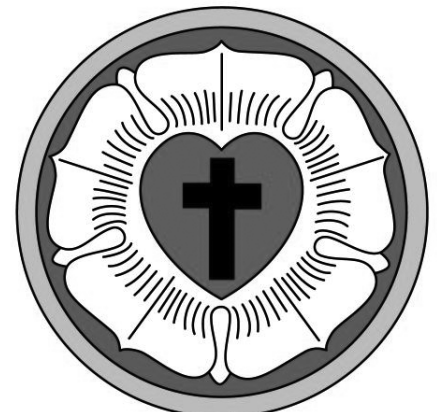

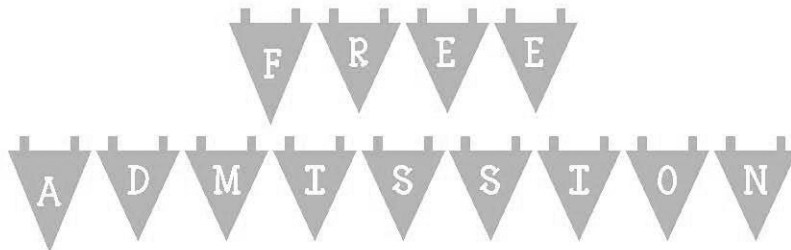

Fall greetings, friends in Christ!

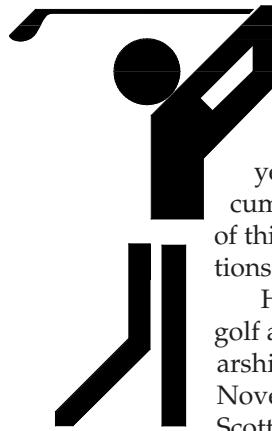
We are looking forward to the temperatures that go with “fall” and hoping they do just that! Welcome to our Seasonal Friends!

# Medicare Open Enrollment Time

Anyone who is on Medicare, lives with someone who is on Medicare, or simply watches TV is aware that the Medicare annual open enrollment period is upon us. If you are currently a Medicare beneficiary, it isn't necessary to re-enroll. Medicare enrollment is a one-time occurrence. Open enrollment does allow beneficiaries to switch their coverage between original Medicare and Medicare Advantage plans.

When the legislation enacting Medicare was originally passed, Part A, covering hospitalization, and Part B, covering expenses such as doctors' visits, were based on an insurance model. As such, Original Medicare comes with premiums, deductibles, co-pays, and limitations on service. In most cases, Medicare pays 80 percent of the Medicare-approved amount and the beneficiary pays the remainder. To assist beneficiaries cover the costs Medicare doesn't pay, two options have developed.

▼ The first is supplemental insurance, also known as **Medigap insurance**, which covers expenses Medicare doesn't cover. There are 10 levels of Medigap insurance coverage, each identified by a letter of the alphabet. All policies within a certain level are required by federal law to offer the same coverage. Every insurance carrier is not required to offer all 10 levels of coverage. However a company must offer level "A" (the most basic) if it offers any Medigap policy. Also, if a company offers any level of Medigap policy, it must offer plan "C" or "F." To determine if a Medigap policy is best for you, first determine the level of coverage that best meets your needs and then select an insurance carrier that appears to offer you the best price and service.

▼ The second alternative is a **Medicare Advantage Plan**, officially known as Part "C." If you enroll in a Medicare Advantage Plan, you will receive Part A benefits (hospital insurance) and Part B benefits through the Advantage Plan. There are different type of Advantage Plans, but all are a form of what is generically known as managed

care. The appeal of Advantage Plans is that they cover services not offered by Original Medicare such as vision and dental services and prescription drugs. However, you must follow plan rules including selecting your health provider from the plan's network of physicians.

Watching the TV ads or reading the marketing information arriving in your mailbox can be confusing. When deciding between Original Medicare, Original Medicare with a Medigap policy, or an Advantage Care Plan, thoroughly researching your options is important. When comparing costs, look beyond the premium price to determine co-pays and deductibles. Do the co-pays and deductibles outweigh the benefit of the additional services? How important is the ability to see any healthcare provider that accepts Medicare? Most doctors do but not all. To assist in your research go to [www.Medicare.gov](http://www.Medicare.gov) or refer to the Center for Medicare Services publication, *Medicare and You*, which is published annually.
