New Life, Every Day

On the very first Easter Sunday, I believe Jesus walked out of the tomb and the universe changed. Suddenly there was no mountain too high, no person too low, no challenge too wide and no path too long for the God who defeated death. On that one morning, hope was infused into every moment of our lives, from first cry to last sigh. Death is never the end of the story when Jesus is the author.

This means that Jesus can overcome any challenge. Discouraged people? Broken relationships? Messy situations? Impossible odds? No problem. Jesus is orchestrating new life every day, and it all started with an empty tomb.

Consider Braheam Murphy, a promising football player at Harding High School in Charlotte, North Carolina. His coach, Sam Greiner, noticed that his grades were dropping and almost kicked him off the team. Little did he know that Braheam was struggling just to find a place to sleep at night. His mother died when he was 5. His father remarried and had no room for him in a one-bedroom apartment. During high school he slept in the homes of extended family members, rotating from couch to couch every few nights. This lifestyle left little room for homework or extra practice.

Braheam opened up to his coach about his living situation and how he dreamed of something more. He asked Coach Greiner if he could live with him so that he could continue to study and

play football. Greiner said yes. Once he had stability in his life, Murphy brought his grades up quickly. In December 2017, he helped lead his high school to win the North Carolina state championships for the first time since 1952. A recruiter from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point noticed Braheam and offered him a full scholarship to play football for Army.

Consider Amanda Richer. After surviving a traumatic brain injury, Amanda could no longer hold a job due to her disability and chronic pain. She lost her home and was forced to live in a tent under a bridge in Seattle. Richer became involved with local homeless organizations and worked at soup kitchens to get free meals. She met Mark Horvath, a man who has a nonprofit organization called Invisible People. He interviews homeless people for the organization's YouTube

channel. He found Amanda under that bridge and interviewed her. Despite Amanda's circumstances, she stood out because of her smiling, bubbly personality.

During her interview, Mark asked her how she remains positive while being homeless. She responded, "You have to get through it. You have to remind yourself that you are a person. You are not an object. And it doesn't matter who threw you away ... you are worthy of getting through this."

After her interview went online in December 2017, Mark started a GOFUNDME campaign for Amanda. People around the world donated and Amanda was finally able to get an apartment.

With so much bad news out there, these stories show us where hope can be found in our world — in a high school locker room or in a tent under a bridge. The hope that flows from the empty tomb reaches everywhere. Expect it. Better yet, deliver it.

It was once said, "Hope is a good thing, maybe the best of things." Because of Easter, we have the audacity to hope when life falls apart. We hope for healing in our broken relationships. We hope for our kids to live in a world of peace. We hope for our church to thrive as we love our neighbors. We hope for grand reunions with those we have love and lost. We hope for an end to hate and violence. We hope.

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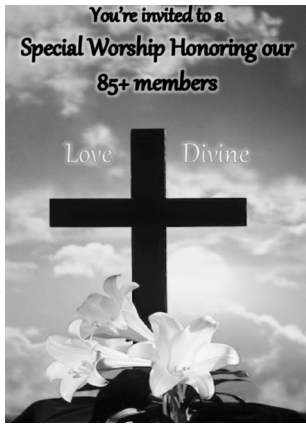

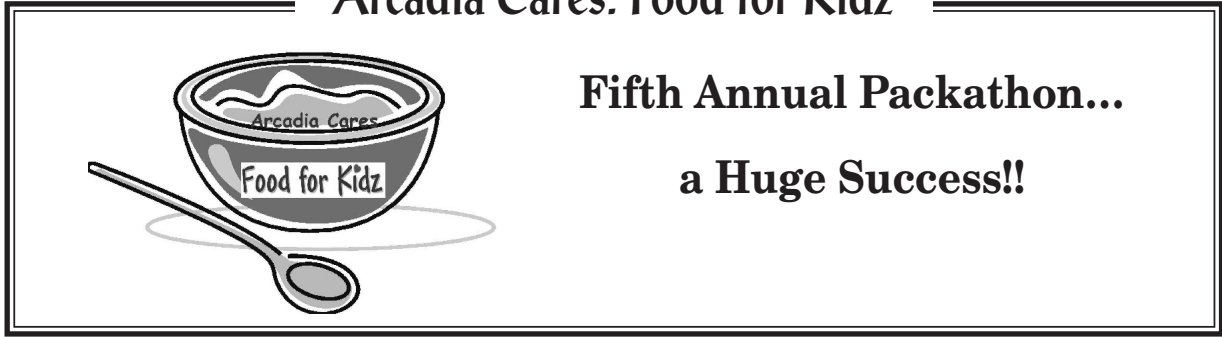

Arcadia Cares: Food for Kidz



Fifth Annual Packathon... a Huge Success!!

The Fifth Annual Arcadia Cares: Food for Kidz Packathon, held in our gym on Saturday, March 23, 2019, was an amazing success. The event was a complete community effort with approximately 600 volunteers from ages 3 and up from the Arcadia neighborhood and beyond, including Prince of Peace Church and Preschool, Church of the Latter Day Saints, Christ Lutheran School, Veritas Charter School, Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, Brownies, Hopi Elementary School, Ingleside Middle School, Arcadia High School, and many others. Once the dust had settled, the final number of rice & bean meals packed was 122,046. The five-year total of meals packed is nearly 480,000!



Nearly 95,000 of the meals packed this year were delivered to the Valley View Community Food Bank and will remain in the Phoenix area to serve needy families and individuals. Approximately 3500 meals were delivered to the Navajo Mission in Rock Point, Arizona. The balance of nearly 24,000 meals will be sent by Food for Kidz to various overseas locations.

The Perils of Falling

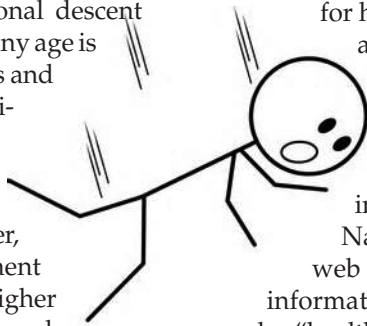

A fall is an unintentional descent to the ground. Anyone of any age is in danger of falling. Babies and toddlers can fall off furniture while older children may fall off playground equipment and teenagers fall playing sports. However, older people are the segment of the population at a higher risk of falling and falls can be especially serious for the elderly because of the increased danger of breaking a bone, especially hips.

The elderly are more susceptible to falling because of medications they may be taking or from illnesses such as low blood pressure, diabetes, or Parkinson's disease. Declining vision also increases the chances of falling. Balance problems and muscle weakness contribute to an increased chance of falling and can lead to a fear of falling. The fear of falling can cause a person to become less active which leads to muscle weakness which in turn increases the chance of falling.

Commonsense suggestions for preventing falls include eliminating clutter, removing furniture from high-traffic areas; securing or removing loose rugs and storing necessities such as food, clothing, etc. within easy reach. Also ensure that the house is well lit and turn on lights when going from room to room. Install handrails on both sides of stairways and grab bars in the bathroom. However, these alone may not be sufficient.

No one course of action will reduce falls. Recently there has been increased interest in evidence-based fall prevention programs. These programs are being held in assisted living and skilled nursing facilities. Classes are also offered at senior centers and other locations within the community. One of these programs that has been found to successfully reduce the number of falls is "A Matter of Balance" which was developed at the University of Boston. Led by a trained instructor, it is an eight-week structured group interaction which teaches exercises to increase activity levels and improve strength and confidence. It also discusses fall prevention strategies, how to get up safely from a non-life threatening fall, and stresses the importance of asking



for help. Each session lasts for approximately two hours. The Area Agency on Aging (602.264.2265) can provide information on where classes are offered in Maricopa County. The National Council on Aging's web site (www.noac.org) has information on similar programs under "healthy living."

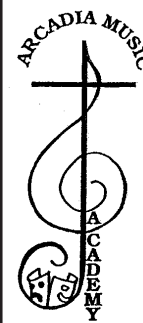
Many falls are not reported to health-care providers because of self-blame or embarrassment. As a result, unless a fall results in serious injury, physicians are unaware a patient has fallen and therefore can't offer suggestions on how to reduce the danger of falling. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that each year one out of five falls causes serious injury; three million elderly patients are treated for falls in an ER, and 800,000 patients are hospitalized because of a fall injury. If more senior citizens and their families are aware of programs like "A Matter of Balance," perhaps that number will be reduced.
