Time Value

(This article was originally written in 1997 and published at Prince of Peace in 2010.)

Today I have too much to do and too little time to do it. This should no longer be surprising since this seems to be the constant theme of my life. A few minutes ago, I plopped down in my office chair and took a moment to gaze at the African art that occupies nearly every nook and cranny of my office. I can feel the desire to return to Africa rising in my soul. It has been far too long. But then again, time is valued very differently in Africa.

In 1996, I journeyed to Zimbabwe with a group of classmates and professors from Luther Seminary. Our goal was to do our coursework in a different context and thereby allow the context to inform our studies. After all, even an outsider can see that Christianity is lived very differently in Africa. Little did I know that the context would impact how I view the world.

At the beginning of our time in Zimbabwe, we were driven out to rural mission stations to visit local pastors and community leaders and to worship in Zimbabwean Lutheran churches. We were told to stay for a few days and then use local transportation to make our way back to the capital city of Harare. This meant riding overcrowded buses that were sometimes held together with duct tape and African ingenuity.

The bus stops in Zimbabwe were usually nothing more than small signs nailed to trees by the side of the road. There were no schedules, simply rumors passed from person to person that a bus might arrive at a certain time. When my group arrived at the bus stop at 5:30 a.m. for our return trip to Harare, there were people from all walks of life (some with farm animals) waiting for the bus. When the bus didn't arrive by 10 a.m., the locals continued to wait patiently while I became agitated. There were many things I wanted to do that day, and waiting under a tree was not one of them. I began to check my watch every five minutes.

It didn't take long for me to realize that the stress I was creating for myself wouldn't make the bus come any faster. I asked a local man why Zimbabweans didn't seem concerned about when the bus would come. He laughed and said, "In Zimbabwe, we value people more than time." He called the concept "Africa time." It dawned on me that in our culture of busyness and distraction, we have a tendency to become slaves to time at the expense of valuing people. As I began to let go of my manic need to control time, I discovered that time no longer controlled me. I began to talk to people at that bus stop.

Paul writes in his first letter to Thessalonians, "So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the Gospel of God, but also our own lives, because you have become so dear to us." (1 Thess. 2:8) I have lived this verse sitting at bus stops next to dusty roads in the middle of Zimbabwe. This morning I lived this verse while playing with kids at Vacation Bible School.

Today I have too much to do and too little time to do it. I find myself trying in vain to control time. I long to stand once again on African soil to relearn the lesson of Africa time. I remain convinced that God works wonders in those magical moments when we have the courage to "waste time together."



A Look at Stem Cell Therapy

If you have driven on Indian School Road recently, you may have seen a prominent sign that reads "STEM CELLS" In front of 4440 E. Indian School Road. If you happened to be listening to Morning Edition on KJZZ on April 2, you may have heard Dr. Joseph Sirven discussing a patient who paid several thousand dollars for stem cell therapy to improve her brain function after she suffered a stroke, but received no benefit. How are these two events connected? They are both evidence of the growing number of stem cell clinics offering unproven therapies.

Stem cells are special cells with the potential to repair damaged tissue and organs. There are different types of stem cells. Stem cells that come from human embryos or are specially programmed in a laboratory can be turned into any kind of cell and theoretically can turn into any cell in the human body. Adult stem cells, taken from fully developed tissue can only turn into the type of tissue from which they came. As a result, their therapeutic potential is much more limited. These are the types of cells offered by clinics offering stem cell therapy. Important clinical research and trials are currently being conducted by major research institutions in the United States and worldwide. However, the FDA has only approved the use of embryonic stem cells to treat certain blood disorders, such as leukemia and some forms of anemia and for tissue grafts to treat diseases which injure the skin, bones or surface of the eyes ... and has not approved the use of adult stem cells to treat any illness or injury.

However, lack of approval has not stopped unscrupulous clinicians from claiming that they can offer stem cell therapy to treat conditions such as chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (OCPD), joint injuries, lupus, diabetes, and macular degeneration. Patients try the unproven treatments because they are seeking miracle cures. The fortunate only lose money, usually a lot of it, while the less fortunate suffer severe side effects such as blindness, kidney failure, bacterial infection or paraplegia or death.

The FDA is cracking down on clinics offering unproven treatments. There are also steps that those considering stem cell therapy can and should take to protect themselves. Beware of hype and hefty fees. Doctors testing stem cell treatments in carefully controlled clinical trials, usually don't post flashy advertisements and promise drastic improvements or total cures. Be suspicious of any doctor who claims to treat a wide range of medical conditions. Before beginning treatment, ask if the FDA has approved the treatment. Also ask for the FDA-issued Investigational New Drug Application number and ask to see the actual approval letter to ensure that it has been issued specifically for the treatment you're considering. If your treatment is part of a clinical trial, you must sign a consent form that explains the experimental procedure. Before signing, be sure that you understand the entire process and known risks. Also ask for the clinical investigator's brochure which includes a short description of the product and information about its safety and effectiveness. Other questions to ask include: Where will the cells come from? What will be done with them before they are injected into your body? How will they resolve your injury or illness?

At some time in the future, stem cell therapy may be the miracle cure hoped for. Until that time, be cautious when considering treatment.
